# WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR TRANSITIONING PATIENTS WITH PSYCHOSIS TO ADULT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES?

### For patients receiving services through a BC Early Psychosis Intervention (EPI) Program

BC EPI programs provide care to both youth and adults; there is no need for you to transition your patient to adult psychosis services. This is managed within the program.

The most responsible physician (community pediatrician or family physician) remains responsible for transition of other care services.

## For patients who need but are not currently linked to a psychosis intervention program

BC's EPI programs are offered in each health authority area; scope of service and ages served vary by community. Physician referral is not required: Anyone can refer including self-referral.

### **SPECIALIZED SERVICES FOR PATIENTS WHO HAVE NOT RESPONDED TO TREATMENT**

The <u>BC Psychosis Program</u> is a provincial resource funded by BC Mental Health and Substance Use Services. The program is located at the UBC Hospital, and provides unique, highly specialized inpatient services to patients who require treatment for psychosis. Patients are referred to this program when other treatment approaches have been ineffective or partially effective. Each health authority coordinates its own referral process through the tertiary mental health facility within its region.
